


Traditional African care practices that promote young children's development

In general, African children in their first year of life develop well, but this is not always recognised. The earliest written observations of African children's development were made by European explorers. Their observations were coloured by their colonial mindset and they tended to emphasise things that African children couldn't or didn't do when compared to European children, or things that African parents didn't do in

calming, and the upright position of the baby helps the baby to be alert to the many sights and sounds to which the baby is exposed as a result of the mother's activities. The mother is very sensitive to the baby's state because the baby's body is against hers. She can feel when her baby is fretting, or wants to urinate, and she can respond immediately to her baby.





Care for Child Development




The Care for Development intervention is based on the best available evidence of child development. It incorporates the most recent evidence on the identification of critical caregiver skills affecting the child's healthy growth and development (sensitivity and responsiveness) and the research demonstrating that these important skills can be taught to caregivers. Caregivers and families are best placed to support children's growth and development through daily activities and interactions. Families often need assistance to focus on the most important activities for the development of young children's play and communication.

Care for Child Development can be used by a variety of health and community workers to provide age-appropriate guidance to caregivers

Biggest investment

- Biggest investment is in training and capacity development
- The largest activity/intervention across the Initiative
- Greatest effort and funds





Highlight: Innovation

- Development and testing of a digital
 application to provide instant
 information in the field the Information
 for Action App
- Collects, interprets and pushes data back to the level needed eg the household, community-based child care centre, field supervisor
- At the same time pushing data up to increasing levels of aggregration

Measuring Child Development

- Height and weight
- Developmental milestones

Using simple transportable tools


- Portable, calibratable weight scale

 Questionnaire




 Easily understood tools, feedback, counselling cues, decision, tools

Progress IFA App

- Undertaking pilot testing in Kenya and South Africa in collaboration with PATH
- Getting "Silicon Valley support with the help of Firelight
- Preparing a randomised control trial with 3 arms:
 - Community worker support
 - Community worker support with App
 - Parent and family use of App
- Acknowledgement: REPSSI (2006)

Highlight: Filling Gaps

- Standardising the ASQ
- No locally normed developmental measures
- ASQ Widely used reliable and valid assessment of development of children between 2 months to 5 years of age
- Covers 21 closely spaced times points within first 5 years – 5 domains of development
- Testing 420 normally growing semi-urban children in South Africa
- Testing 420 normally growing rural children in Zambia (Prof Beatrice Matafwali)

Highlight: Rigorous Evaluation

- Working with CRS to assess impact of quality and quantity (dose) of community-based child care centres on school readiness and first year school performance (Malawi)
- Advising Care on a randomised comparison of livelihood, ECD and accountability interventions on children's development (Mozambique)
- Tracking Save the Children's evaluation of the EP in Malawi (Dr Lorraine Sherr)
